Over the past decade, Empowerment through Law of the Common People (ELCOP) has been producing anti-empire law students in order to bring organic transformation in the human society in the context of present day realities of overall human rights situation at home and abroad. With a vision of 'empowering with the poor is lawyering for justice', ELCOP trains up law students to be acquainted with broader concepts and standards of human rights and dignity than those of their academic syllabus. Going beyond the traditional teaching method of law schools in Bangladesh, ELCOP nurtures law students through different learning modules like Street Lawyering, Human Rights Summer School (1996) and Community Law Reform (CLR) research program.

Being the tenth in a row of annual CLR research publications, this book presents the human rights scenario of the Harijan community in Bangladesh. Under the direct supervision of law academics and lawyers, the CLR researchers from different universities, who were selected from among the participants of the 34th and the 15th HRCOs, have contributed an extensive socio-legal analysis of the Harijan community's diasporic history, culture, family and kinship, socio-economic rights, and justice delivery system. In particular, the process of social exclusion and marginalization in relation to the condition of the Harijan women is critically examined. In short, this book evaluates as to how the ritually determined 'caste-based identity' or the identity of 'untouchability' tends to create an environment of inequality in the society, which eventually results in serious injustice for the Harijans of Bangladesh, both in individual level as well as in community sphere.



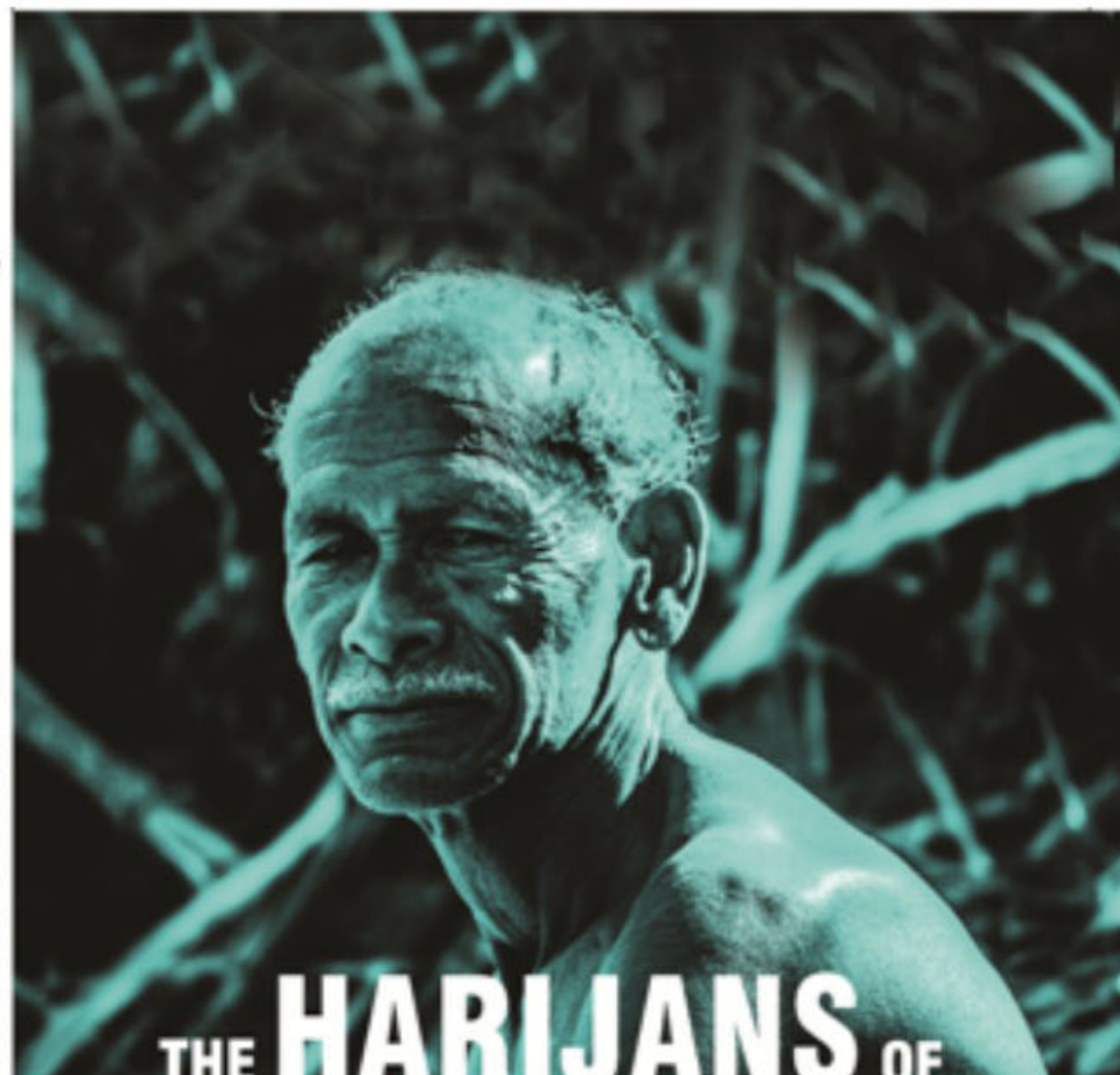
